We remember the faithful departed, particularly members of our families and our friends. There is sadness in this remembering, but also healing of grief as we commend those, we love who have died to the merciful keeping of God.

# November 5<sup>th</sup> Bonfire Night.

On November 5<sup>th</sup> we remember the Gunpowder Plot – an attempt to blow up the King and Parliament on November 5<sup>th</sup>, 1605. In remembering an assassination plot that failed we can also remember all those who are victims of political assassination, political prisoners, and those in

fear of violence because they speak out against those who wield power unjustly and violently.

'Remember, remember the 5<sup>th</sup> of November, the Gunpowder Treason and Plot.'

### November 11<sup>th</sup> Armistice Day.

The Armistice, an agreement to end the fighting of the First World War as a prelude to peace negotiations, began at 11am on 11<sup>th</sup> November 1918. Remembrance Sunday



is observed on the closest Sunday to 11<sup>th</sup> November which this year is November 13<sup>th</sup>. We wear poppies to remind us of all those who have died, and are still dying, in war, and as Christians, we commit ourselves to working for peace and justice throughout the world.

#### My favourite hymn - Or - What gets my foot tapping!

I like singing (I'm in the choir at St Michael's) and I've got lots of hymns I love to sing – and some that are a bit of an ordeal. So, what is a hymn? To me a hymn is a prayer put to music, so for a hymn to get anywhere near my top ten, it's got to have both a great tune and the words must mean something as well. There's a lot of good tunes out there; 'Stella' – Jesu my Lord, my God, my all (483) 'Anima Christi 'Soul of my Saviour, sanctify my breast' (322) but the words don't do it for me. My top three are all quite old – it's not that I disprove of the new ditties, it's just that the centuries have yet to winnow out the chaff, although 'Make me a Channel of your Peace (519) was looking good until the words got commandeered by a certain Prime Minister in 1979 – it was never the same for me after that.

That leaves me with 'Hail Gladdening Light, of his pure glory poured' (16) which not only has a tremendously uplifting tune (especially in the Tenor part), the words are a prayer of adoration and thanks, but it is also from the Greek, 3<sup>rd</sup> Century or earlier, i.e., right from the beginning of Christianity where it all began. The downside is that it is so short (only ten lines) that' you've finished before you've properly started.

'Abide with me' (10) is also one of my three top hymns, especially when you know that the Revd Henry Lyte knew he was dying when he wrote it in 1847. We sang it at my father's funeral and the words of verse four in particular 'Where is deaths sting? Where, grave thy victory' are poignant — and it almost goes without saying that the Tenor harmony is superb on that line. However, I still feel young now, who knows in ten to fifteen years, this might become my favourite hymn.

Which leaves 'O Lord my God when I in awesome wonder' - How Great thou art! (262) as my favourite hymn. Why? It's a translation from a Russian Orthodox hymn for starters – the Orthodox Church seems more spiritual and mystical somehow than the Catholic,

possibly (in my view) because when the Orthodox Church developed it still had a working secular authority (the Byzantine Emperor) to keep its political ambitions in check whereas the Catholic Church grew up in the ruins of the Roman Empire. The tune just pulls you in and the chorus is a gospel of praise.

The words make me feel small, humble, and yet loved all at once and sometimes I have difficulty in singing verse four 'When Christ shall come with shouts of acclamation and take me home — what joy shall fill my heart!' without welling up. And above all, when I have finished singing that hymn, in Church, with the Choir and congregation, all is well with the world again!!

### **Saving the Planet and Saving Money?**

Managing our finances is not easy at the moment. Prices are rising on pretty much everything from fuel to food. Some people are being hit much harder than others since they were already living on a tight budget.

Just as the need for food banks is rising so the ability of people to donate is diminishing. In the face of these challenges, and despite the extreme heat, the climate and ecological emergencies have slipped down the list of priorities for some. This is understandable. And yet, saving money whilst still working on saving the planet is not impossible. So here are a few suggestions that will both save money and contribute to building a sustainable future:

- Cutting down shower time from 10 minutes to 8 minutes (and not many of us need 8 minutes) could save you £43/ year for each person in the house.
- Switch from tumble drying your clothes to air drying them whenever possible. This could save up to £180/year
- Switching to LED lightbulbs will save you MORE money than sticking with old style ones and remembering to switch off the lights every time you leave a room.
- Turning off electric devices at the wall: the more you have to turn off, the more you will save e.g. one games console regularly turned off at the wall can save you up to £25/year
- Boil a full kettle in the morning and store the water in a thermos for hot drinks throughout the day.
- Wash clothes at lower temperatures. Even moving from 40 degrees down to 30 could save you £12/year

The ultimate aim would be to enable the gospel to reach wider and deeper.

#### Wider:

We currently offer 4 services a week, three of which use the ancient liturgy of The Book of Common Prayer (BCP). The BCP liturgy can be beautiful, but is not very accessible for those who haven't grown up with it. Our fourth service, the Sunday 9.30am service, is also traditional in format and style, and includes Holy Communion on all but one Sunday a month. At St Chad's we're quite unusual for the Church of England in that lots of those who come are under 45 years old. Although preferences for types of music or worship style or learning methods are not necessarily defined by age, people of different backgrounds and ages do have different needs and expectations. Most people under 45 have never gone regularly to church, so when they walk through the doors for the first time everything can feel quite alien. An informal, contemporary service would be more accessible for the many people in our parish who have never been regular church-goers in the past but want to come and explore faith with us.

#### Deeper:

We would love everyone who comes to St Chad's to grow into a deeper faith and spirituality. But we recognise different people have different needs. Younger generations typically have very limited knowledge of the bible, or a familiarity with traditional hymns, because they didn't get the same diet of bible stories and singing in assemblies as older generations did. The sermon might come as a bit of a shock because they're far more used to learning through interaction, exploration and discussion, than sitting and receiving teaching from the front - just think about the change we've seen in the way teaching is delivered in classrooms and universities over the last 20 years!

We know that the message of the gospel and the love of Jesus is for everyone. Our ambition is to offer a programme of services at St Chad's that provides for everyone. A programme that enables everyone to grow in faith and in love for Jesus from whatever their starting point. Watch this space to see how our vision for worship progresses over the months to come.

#### Wide and Deep - St Chad's Worship Review

I pray that you, being rooted and established in love, may have power, together with all the Lord's holy people, to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ, and to know this love that surpasses knowledge—that you may be filled to the measure of all the fullness of God.

Ephesians 3:17b-19

Before the pandemic hit, St Chad's had a Vision Day and collected ideas and feedback to help us plan for the future. Feedback from the Vision Day showed a diversity in the preferred style and formality of worship. Some treasured the traditional choral style of worship at St Chad's, others were keen for us to develop more informal and contemporary worship.

Our Vision Team and PCC are currently reviewing the programme of worship on offer at St Chad's, taking into consideration:



- the Vision Day feedback
- the needs of our Parish as a whole
- current research into the best ways to nurture faith and discipleship across the generations
- responses to our recent Worship Survey

In particular, we are considering whether we might introduce a more contemporary service into the mix, whilst merging some of the existing services to make space. Or, whether we should make the 9.30am service more contemporary and informal to meet the needs of the wider parish.

All of this information is from <u>www.thisismoney.co.uk</u> It will both save you money and reduce your carbon footprint.

### A few other things to bear in mind:

- Planning meals to avoid food waste will save money and reduce carbon and methane emissions
- Buying 'wonky' fruit and veg is also a double win
- If you have school age children, follow Zero Waste Leeds on Facebook and make use of their 'school uniform exchange' scheme
- Make use of websites like 'Freegle' and 'Freecycle' to both give and search for items: no cost and no extra carbon.
- If you have a smartphone, make use of 'Olio' and 'Too Good to Go' to track down free (Olio) or very cheap food offers

etc. OR ensuring that our saving are invested ethically to help build the sustainable future we are working towards. These words of Jesus from Matthew 6:19 take on a new meaning in our present global situation: "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume and where thieves break in and steal."



#### **Autumn Reflections**

Many years ago in his Ode to Autumn, the poet John Keats hauntingly described it as a 'season of mists and mellow fruitfulness' — a gentle yet powerful phrase which surely draws us into a sense of well-being and perhaps even nostalgia.

I often recall a stroll to the top of Beamsley Beacon in Lower Wharfedale around this time of year, sitting on the crags as a cloud-inversion filled the Craven Valley with a sea of mist as the projecting hills were highlighted in the low-lying sun.

It was an inspiring and memorable vision of God's creation and as I scrambled down, reflecting on the experience, warm autumn colours on the trees emerged to reinforce the wonders of nature. Over the years as the transition from autumn to winter approaches. Keats reflection reminds me of words from Paul's Letter to the Galations in which he considers 'fruits of the spirit' as bringing freedom in Christ through life by the Spirit – espousing qualities such as love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. Autumn is a time of transition in climate and nature, bringing vital opportunities which surely prompt us as Christians to reflect on our wider responses to God's calling in this time and place.

As the seasons change bringing 'all things new', we ourselves are guided by faith through the metaphorical mists which surround us in the pressures, challenges or even chaos so characteristic of our world today.

Walking in Nidderdale yesterday, with a panorama of warm autumn colours and mellow fruitfulness everywhere, the distractions and busyness of everyday life seemed distant in every sense.

Looking up the valley from above Pateley Bridge, the power of creation was overwhelming in the stillness, silence and scenery.
